A Note from Rev. Irina

Over the Lenten season, I will be making a series of pictures titled "Stations of the Cross". I hope to use these as displays on Good Friday to supplement our stations of the cross liturgy.

Musical Note from Ed Connell

It has often been my practice to play a series of works during Lent, and this year, for no particular reason, I am focusing on two lesser-known composers. The preludes (on piano) are by Erik Satie (1866-1925), a French composer of the early impressionist period. Most people will recognize his first Gymnopedie. The postludes (on organ) are by George Oldroyd (1886-1951), who was a distinguished British organist, teacher and occasional composer. His Liturgical Improvisations were among the very first organ works I learned, and I play them during Advent every year as particular personal favourites.

The St. Tim's Choir is pleased to present a series of traditional spirituals through the Sundays in Lent. We are offering these timeless melodies not merely because they are beautiful and well-loved, but because they happen to reflect remarkably well on the lectionary readings this year.

In addition, the choir continues to mourn the passing of our beloved long time member John Warton, who died just over a year ago. We know that he would be especially moved by this series, and today, we will sing the same stunning version of "Swing Low, Sweet Chariot" that we sang at his funeral. We offer these profound songs to the glory of God, and in loving memory of our beloved John.

- 2. How do you see the archetypal temptations—to turn stones into bread, to rule the world, and to jump off the temple—playing out in contemporary life? Did my reframing of these as convenience, control, and image resonate with you?
- 3. In what ways have you experienced the pressures to prioritize speed and convenience, to stay constantly busy and productive (or simply keep your head above water!), or to seek recognition—sometimes at the expense of process, growth, and deeper fulfillment?
