Music Note

This summer, we have explored together a series of random composers who happen to share having an anniversary in 2025. By very happy co-incidence, several of these composers happen to be creators of lighter music, falling neatly in the space between classical and popular, perfect musical fare for a hot Toronto summer. I enjoyed learning about and exploring music by Fritz Kreisler and Leroy Anderson, but I end the summer with the ever popular Johann Strauss Jr., the creator of some of the world's most famous and beloved dance music and operettas, including "The Blue Danube", "Kaiser Waltz", "Tales from the Vienna

Woods", "Tritsch Tratsch Polka", "Die Fledermaus" and "The Gypsy Baron".

The son of a famous composer, father and son did not get along, and when the elder Strauss discovered the younger trying to learn the violin, he gave the son a severe whipping. The father eventually abandoned the family in favour of a mistress, and the son was finally able to study towards being a musician and composer.

His early career was hampered by his father's influence, who controlled the orchestral scene in Vienna and beyond at the time. Then, in 1848, the Austrian revolution again split father and son on political lines, with Jr taking the more challenging side of the revolutionaries, which again hampered his career. But in 1849, his father died, and he was able to merge their two orchestras and move on to considerable success.

His health was fragile, however, and in 1853, he suffered a nervous breakdown. But he recovered and toured extensively, including America in 1872, where he was enormously popular. As was customary at the time, there were frequent requests for personal mementos, which usually took the form of a lock of hair. So many requests came from his American female admirers that his valet was obliged to take clippings from Strauss's black Newfoundland dog.

Strauss was admired by other important musicians, including Richard Wagner and Richard Strauss. But he was personal friends with Johannes Brahms. According to multiple sources, Strauss's wife Adele approached Brahms with a request that he autograph her fan. It was customary

for the composer to inscribe a few notes of his best-known music along with a signature. Brahms, however, inscribed a bit of the "Blue Danube", and then wrote "Unfortunately, NOT by Brahms."
